Seattle Forklift License - Within North America, acquiring a forklift license or forklift certification involves classroom and hands-on training. Regulatory control over licensing, certification and training for powered industrial truck operators falls under the jurisdiction of provincial, federal and state groups. Operators could get a license either by a third party or through training administered by the employer. In any case, regulatory requirements need to be met. Recertification is necessary every two to three years.

Lift trucks are powered industrial trucks that come with various options, like stand-up and sit-down. There are different sizes and types of forklift suitable for various industrial applications. Operator training courses are often individualized to be able address the particular uses and kinds for which the operator is training. Training on a gas-powered, sit-down forklift within a warehouse surroundings would not be the same as training on a propane-powered, stand-up forklift in a shipyard. The different forklifts and their uses makes it impossible to establish universal licensing requirements for all equipment and businesses. Regulatory standards, hence, tend not to focus on particular course requirements but rather on the results of individual training courses.

Employer-provided, on-the-job training is the most common way for operators to receive their forklift license or certification. This particular method of certification requires the employer to provide practical training and classroom sessions on machines within the workplace. Employers may opt to train workers on each and every kind of forklift separately, or to train them on all machines combined. The program incorporates forklift operation methods, company rules, forklift maintenance and safety measures. Topics particular to the worksite, such as hazardous conditions or materials, should be included. Following classroom learning, operators are taught how to safely operate and utilize every kind of lift truck on the worksite.

Certification through a third-party vendor generally needs an on-site component together with hands-on practice.

Normally, a certification provided by an employer will not transfer from the existing employer to the next employer. Receiving a lift truck license through employer-provided training enables the operator to run a forklift for that specific employer only.

Forklift safety would always be an important factor of the lift truck license training, even though the particulars of the safety training will be dependent upon the machines being used. Several safety issues will differ for every employer and industry. Both third-party providers and employer-provided training may have to deal with additional requirements for safety training in applicable industries, such as in marine and offshore operations.
